

The NAC Board and staff have worked to progress important cultural projects over the past year, which address the cultural priorities of Ngarlawangga. Since the last update in July the following projects undertaken and progressed:


- Attendance and Ranger discussions at the Dangkal Gwo'yal-wa: First Nations Land and Water Management Forum in Darwin, NT (27-30th August, 2024)
- Ngarlawangga Ranger Program
- Development of a Ngarlawangga Language Plan and Welcome to Country Workshop with Bundiyarra Irra Wangga Language Centre and Ngarlawangga Elders in Tom Price. WA (10-14 June 2024)
- Attendance at the AIATSIS & ANU Austrlaian Languages Workshop and Training in Canberrra, ACT (20-22 2024)
- Ngarlawangga Traditional Ecological Knowledge Program (TEKP) Fieldtrip II (08-12 July 2024)
- Healthy Country Planning continues with On-Country Consultation (08-12 July 2024)
- Continued development of the Women's Cultural Immersion Experience
- Ngarlawangga Cultural Mapping still being developed

The board and NAC staff have contributed a large amount of time to on country fieldtrips, grant and report writing, workshops and programs to be able to progress these priority cultural projects. An update will be provided on these projects at the next community meeting for all members

Ngarlawangga Cultural Awareness Training through Virtual Reality

Since 2019, the Ngarlawangga Board, Traditional Owners, NAC staff and Rio Tinto have worked collaboratively to create cultural awareness training, delivered through Virtual Reality (VR) technology. The cultural awareness training aims to provide participants with a stronger awareness around Ngarlawangga culture, people and country, and creates a deeper understanding around wildlife, waterways and stories connected to country and culture.

The training is aimed at participants who may be working with Ngarlawangga country and people, and provides the first steps toward cultural understanding and respect.



NAC currently has five (5) Virtual Reality headsets located in the Perth (4) and Port Hedland (1) Offices to view the cultural awareness training video.

The roles and objectives of a NAC Ranger Program have not yet been established. However, the role of an Indigenous Ranger often involves using cultural knowledge and western science to protect native plants and animals, control feral animal populations and invasive weeds, reduce dangerous wildfires and manage cultural sites and tourism on country.
